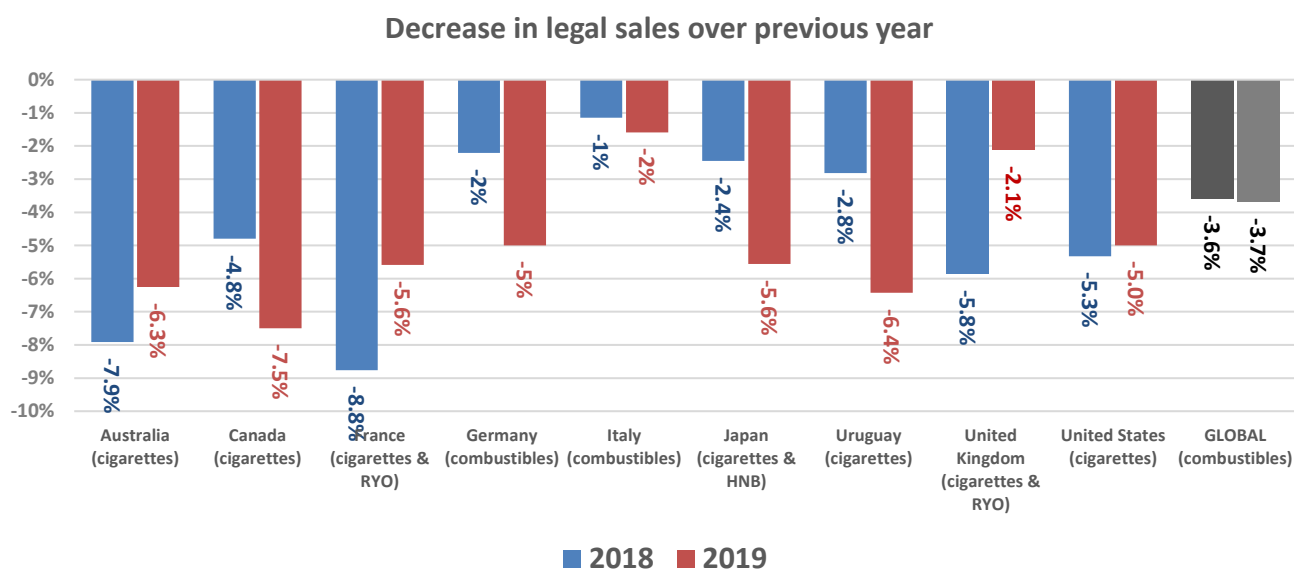


Tobacco sales in G7 and selected other countries

In 2019, Health Canada reported that there was a larger decrease in wholesale shipments of cigarettes between 2018 and 2019 than had been experienced in previous years. Cigarette shipments declined from 25.8 to 23.9 billion sticks, or 7.5%. The decline was unevenly distributed, with sales falling at much different rates in the most populous provinces of Ontario (9.7%) and Quebec (3.3%). [1]

To compare the Canadian experience with that in other comparable countries, data was sought for the remaining 6 of the G7 countries (France, Germany, Italy, Japan, the United Kingdom and the United States) as well as other countries with advanced tobacco control regulatory systems (Australia, Brazil, Uruguay). Data was found in corporate documents of British American Tobacco and Philip Morris International, in World Bank estimates and in government reports from the United Kingdom and France. This information is presented in the table and figure below.
